
OU André Braga & Cláudia Figueiredo with Panaibra Canda





Resulting from a collaboration between André Braga & Cláudia Figueiredo and Mozambican choreographer Panaibra Canda, *OU* emerges from the desire to create from a specific landscape: Inhambane, a land of family and colonial memories, where the present mingles with the reverberations of the past.

With a strongly transdisciplinary language, *OU* weaves together dance, sound, video, and spoken word into a sensory fabric that invites listening and imagination. The performance is an invitation to think about History through fiction, fabulation, and the ghostly presence as a

form of justice and remembrance. Here, the body does not merely dance: it speaks, remembers, resists, and dreams.



"The voice of the sea filled the sky and the earth. A voice that is full and breaks, and never ends."

In its continuous ebb and flow, the sea brings and carries with it memories from all times.

It was the sea that brought Vasco da Gama to Inhambane, a city in southern Mozambique which he named "Land of Good People."

And it was through the sea that thousands of enslaved people were taken from Inhambane, many of them lost forever to its waters.

"— The sea is a world. In the sea, there is life. There are mountains, plants, wind, and fish. There is human life in the depths."

Inspired by the mythology of Drexciya—which imagines an underwater people descended from African slaves thrown overboard during the Atlantic crossing — and by the testimony of a healer from Inhambane about her experiences with sea spirits, *OU* reflects on multiple encounters.

The encounter of two bodies—with their forces, abstractions, stories, and desires. The encounter between sea and land, the visible and the invisible, the ancestral and the contemporary, the spiritual and the earthly.

"Memory is rooted in the tangible—in spaces, gestures, images, and objects." We are interested in thinking about History from other perspectives, other voices, other languages, and from a cross-thinking that overlays past, present, and future. We continue to explore what Paul Carter called the "politics of the ground": "a new way of treading that does not flatten the land, but allows the ground to climb the body, to determine gestures and movements in a new social choreography."

She says she went to the sea, after twelve years of preparation with an elder. She says that on the first day she went into the sea, she entered around 3 p.m. and came out the next day at 4 a.m. She brought back medicines, shells, and plants for burning.

Now, explaining what happens there in the sea is not easy, because it's not her. It's her transformed into a spirit. That spirit enters, does all the work, and only after it leaves does she return as a person.

It's a mystery, an ancient secret that can never be revealed.



"Two bodies that History did not drown allow themselves to be carried by the sea."

In *OU*, a Portuguese and a Mozambican—André Braga and Panaibra Canda—meet and reflect one another in a place of the living, the dead, and the ghosts of both: the Indian Ocean.

OU is about telling another story.

What the sea returns, what the shells whisper, what the healer who disappears for days into the Indian Ocean bears witness to—"touch far more sensitive and far more interesting places, places that identify us as human."
